


THE SHEBA REBELLION

- David crosses to Gilgal, accompanied by all the troops of Judah and half the men of Israel (2 Samuel 19:40). Sheba calls the men of Israel to follow him.
 Sheba is from the tribe of Benjamin – the same tribe as Saul – so this was probably an attempt to re-establish the house of Saul on the throne.
- David returns to Jerusalem and sends Joab, his general, after Sheba (2 Samuel 20:3–7).
- 3. Sheba's rebellion fails and he is cornered in the fortified city of Abel Beth Maacah (2 Samuel 20:14). Faced with the destruction of their town, the inhabitants kill Sheba and throw his head over the wall. Immediately following Sheba's rebellion there is an account of the execution of Saul's descendants at Gibeon (2 Samuel 21:1–14). This deeply unpleasant story may well reflect David trying to ensure that there will be no further attempts to revive the dynasty of Saul.
